# HISTORY

The Arboretum's roots reach back to 1908. when the Horticultural Research Center (HRC) began developing apple varieties that could survive Minnesota's subzero temperatures. Over the past century, the HRC has developed nearly 100 fruit and ornamental plant introductions, from disease-resistant azaleas and dogwoods to the Frontenac wine grape and the famous Haralson and Honevcrisp apples.
